collaborating in the writing and production of the plan. She is devoted to civic engagement through
culturally responsible, inclusive, and equitable design practice, exemplified in collaborations with the

He has also served in the dean's office at Parsons School for Design, on the arts and culture team at The Ford Foundation as well as on the staff of the Bronx Council on the Arts. Torres serves on the board of directors of United Philanthropy Forum, as well as serving as co-chair of its Public Policy Committee. He holds a Master of Arts in Art History from Hunter College and a Master of Science in Management from The New School.

Denise Brown Executive Director, Leeway Foundation

Denise (pronouns: she/her) is currently Co-Chair of Bread and Roses Community Fund. In addition, she serves on the advisory committee of Philadelphia Volunteer Lawyers for the Arts and the boards of Philadelphia's newly formed Philadelphia Public Access Corporation, Delaware Valley Grantmakers, the Henrietta Wurts Memorial Fund, and Scribe Video Center, a Philadelphia-based media arts organization. She served as Associate Director of the Bread and Roses Community Fund from 1998 to 2005 and was a part of Leeway's program redesign process in 2001. In addition to consulting with the Foundation on a number of projects, she has served as a member of Leeway's Advisory Council and interim Board of Directors, officially joining the staff in July 2006. She previously served on the board of the Funding Exchange and the Women's Community Revitalization Project. A graduate of Brown University, Denise was a film programmer for the Philadelphia Festival of World Cinema, from its debut until 1998. She has also served as a panelist for the Philadelphia Cultural Fund, the Pennsylvania Council on the Arts, and the Pennsylvania Humanities Council.



Tariana Navas-Nieves Director of Cultural Affairs, Denver Arts & Venues
Tariana Navas-Nieves, the director of Cultural Affairs for Denver Arts & Venues, City and County of
Denver, has 30 years of experience in management, equity and race and social justice work,
philanthropy, curatorial practice, translation and interpretation, television, and communications. She
oversees the City departments of Public Art, Cultural Programs & Events, Creative Industries, SCFD
Tier III (Tax District) funding, Arts Education, and the agency's numerous cultural investments and
grant programs. Navas-Nieves is also on the City's Equity Leadership Team responsible for the
oversight and implementation of the City's equity platform working with all City agencies and ~13K
employees. Navas-Nieves serves on national, regional and local boards including: Grantmakers in the
Arts (Chair-elect), Philanthropy Colorado (Vice Chair), Philanthropy Colorado Arts & Culture Funders
(Co-Chair), Denver Latino Commission, and the Community ACTS Fund focused on funding to
support BIPOC, people with disabilities, LGBTQ+, and other historically marginalized communities.
She is co-author of Re-Tool: Racial Equity in the Panel Process, and created the learning series "How
to be an Anti-Racist Organization: A Conversation with Dwinita & Tariana." With an expertise in
Latin American and American Indian art, she has also served in curatorial posts at the Colorado



Springs Fine Arts Center, Denver Art Museum, Museo de las Americas, and for private collections in the US and Puerto Rico.
